THE LAMB 1 Peter 1:18-19

- Jesus Christ is presented as the Lamb of God, without blemish and without spot, whose blood was offered to redeem our souls. This is a main theme of the bible, found from Genesis through Revelation.
- Traditions of your fathers (religion and religious practices) cannot redeem you and save your soul.
- Silver and gold can't buy you a place in heaven or pay for your sin.
- God provided the only acceptable payment for your sin: the blood of His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ.
- The book of Revelation contains God's final words to man. There, Jesus Christ is referred to as the Lamb of God 29 times.

THE LAMB IN HISTORY

- In the Garden: In Genesis 3, after Adam and Eve sinned, God shed the blood of an innocent animal to provide coats of skins to clothe them (3:21). Don't be surprised if you find out that animal was a lamb.
- **Cain and Abel**: In Genesis 4:1-8, Abel knew that the acceptable sacrifice to offer God was an innocent lamb (4:4). He learned that from his parents, Adam and Eve.
 - Abel's blood speaks as a testimony to us today (Heb. 11:4).
 God provided a way for man to be accepted by Him. That way is through the blood of an innocent Lamb.
- Abraham:In Genesis 22:1-8 God instructed Abraham to sacrifice his "only
begotten son," Isaac (Heb 11:17). Abraham told Isaac "God will
provide himself a lamb for a burnt offering" (Vs 8).
 - He didn't say, "God Himself will provide a lamb..." He said, "God-will-provide-Him-self!"

- Abraham's words revealed that one day God would come to Earth as the Lamb and provide Himself as a burnt offering and take away the sin of the world.
- **Passover**:In Exodus 12, God initiated Passover. The blood of an innocent
lamb protected the people from God's wrath and God's
destruction. The blood of a lamb, applied by faith, preserved
those who applied it.
- The Law:The blood of an innocent lamb was incorporated into the
sacrifices under the Law. Millions of lambs were slain over the
passing centuries enabling people to maintain communion with
God.
 - Their assurance of purity (Lev 14), maintenance of fellowship with God (Exod 29), and their acceptance at worship (Lev 23) was maintained by the blood of a lamb.
 - Are you maintaining your communion with God? You don't have to slay a lamb in the morning and evening, but you can freely approach God on a daily basis. Don't neglect that privilege.
- <u>Jesus' birth</u>: In Luke 2:6-11, Jesus was born and placed in a manger. He was born in a place where lambs are born. The angel of the Lord told shepherds that a Savior had been born unto <u>them</u> (vs 11).
- Jesus' baptism: In John 1:25-29, John the Baptist announced that Jesus was "the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world."
- <u>Jesus' death</u>: In Isaiah 53:1-7 Jesus, as a lamb brought to the slaughter, was wounded for our transgressions and bruised for our iniquities.
- Jesus in glory: In Revelation 5:11-13, Jesus is proclaimed to be the worthy Lamb that was slain.
