REVELATION: Lesson 104 Chapter 11:1-4, The Measuring of the Future Earthly Temple

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Most commentators teach that the temple being measured, and everything associated with it is a figurative form of the Church, the Body of Christ. Their reluctance to take the Bible literally has caused much confusion and leaves many parts of the Bible a mystery. We will look at the contrast between the figurative interpretation and the literal interpretation of this passage. In the end, the truth will be revealed.

THE FAILURE OF THE COMMENTATORS:

THE TEMPLE (vss 1-2):	this represents the faithful part of the Church that is living right. John is measuring the size of the Church.
THE ALTAR (vs 1):	This is the Church in worship.
THE OUTER COURT (vs 2):	This represents the activity of the Church.
THE HOLY CITY (vs 2):	This is the Church.
THE TWO WITNESSES (vs 3):	They represent the elect Church (saved Jews/saved Gentiles).
THE WAR OF THE BEAST (7):	Symbolizes the Church experiencing opposition from Satan as they witness.
DEATH OF 2 WITNESSES (8):	Represents Christ's death 2,000 years ago. When they rise, it represents Christ's resurrection. When they ascend, it's the victorious Church vindicated.
ELDERS IN HEAVEN (vs 16):	This is the Church too!
*You can point to a cow and	say, " <i>it's a duck,</i> " but that doesn't make it a duck!

*The figurative method of interpretation is very flawed and always leads to confusion.

*The figurative method makes it easier to change the parts of the Bible you don't agree with. Example: "Fire doesn't really come out of their mouth; it only **represents** the harshness of their words."

The Literal Interpretation (Believing what the Bible says)

- Everything in the first 3 verses pertains to the Jews, not the Church: a temple, an altar, an outer court, a holy city.
 - Where is the holy city? (Mecca, Rome?). According to **Nehemiah 11:1**, and **Isaiah 52:1**, Jerusalem is the holy city. (See also Daniel 9:24, Matthew 4:5, Matthew 27: 52-53).
- John is obviously measuring the temple, altar, etc. in the earthly Jerusalem.
- The Bible only recognizes one other "holy city:" the New Jerusalem in Heaven (Rev 21:2).
 - We know John is not measuring New Jerusalem. Gentiles can't get to it to trample it! (vs 2)
 - \circ $\;$ The temple and the holy city can't be the Church (saved people). Why?
 - The temple is divided between Jew and Gentile. No saved person is counted as a Jew or a Gentile. We are all one in Christ Jesus (<u>Galatians 3:26-28</u>).
 - We are begotten again unto a lively hope (<u>**1 Peter 1:2-3, 9**</u>), no longer Gentile/Jew.
 - The gates of hell shall not prevail against Christ's Church (Matthew 16:18). How can the Gentiles tread upon the Church (Rev 11:2)?
 - Christ rejecters tread upon the blood of Jesus Christ (Heb 10:29), not on the Church.

- Comparing Revelation 11:1 with Revelation 21:15, we find that the earthly city is measured with a "reed like unto a rod" while the heavenly city is measured with a "golden reed."
 - The reed like unto a rod doubles as an instrument of chastening and punishment (see <u>Revelation 2:27, 12:5, 19:15</u>).
 - The golden reed (not a chastening rod) is used to measure New Jerusalem because the Church will not suffer under the wrath of God (Rom 8:1, 1 Thess 5:9).
 - Jesus Christ already suffered for us (Isa 53:5). He was the Rock that was smitten ONE time (Exod 17:6).
 - The Church was built on that Rock (Mat 16:18), not to be smitten by the rod.
 The Church won't be in the Tribulation.

The commentators attempt to point to the historical temples as the object of John's measuring, not believing that a new temple could be built in such short time during the Tribulation.

- Solomon's Temple: destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar (2 Kings 24 and 25).
- Zerubbabel's Temple: destroyed by Antiochus Epiphanes in 168 B.C.
- Herod's Temple (John 2:20): destroyed by Titus in 70 A.D.
 - $\circ~$ John cannot measure something that's been destroyed. He's measuring a future temple.
 - Today the bodies of believers are the Lord's temple (Eph 2:21-22, 1 Cor 6:19, 1 Pet 2:5).
 - The Temple that John measures has a wall of partition separating Jews and Gentiles. There is no such separation in the Church (**Ephesians 2:11-14**).
 - The temple contains an altar. The church has direct access to God because our sacrifice has been made once for all, no further need of an altar of sacrifice (**Hebrews 10:19-22**).
 - Christians need no holy city on earth to be in the presence of God (Eph 2:6).
- This temple is a new earthly temple where the Antichrist will sit, declaring himself to be God (2 Thess 2, Dan 9). He will set up the "abomination that maketh desolate" (Mat 24:15). Many will receive him (Jn 5:43) as being the Messiah.
- Today God doesn't dwell in temples made with hands (<u>Acts 7:47</u>). When God turns again to dealing with the Jews, the temple is back, but the Antichrist will live there.
- The Jews who are worshipping in this temple have returned to Jerusalem in unbelief (if they had trusted their Messiah, they wouldn't need an altar). (Zephaniah 2, Isaiah 66, 28).
- Jerusalem is currently being trodden down by the Gentiles (Luke 21:24), but it is presently not the holy city (<u>Matt 23:34-38</u>) because God is not in it.
- Israel must be reconciled to God before the Earth can be restored (<u>Romans 11:7-15</u>, <u>Deut 32:7-9</u>).
- Revelation 11 is setting things up for the Antichrist. The Jews are in the land with a temple, but are in unbelief, still rejecting Jesus Christ as their Messiah. It will require God's chastening to turn them to Him.
- This chapter is the beginning of the time when God will personally begin to deal with the Jews and punish His chosen people.
